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A MESSAGE FROM THE CHAIRPERSON

I am delighted to present the 2023 European Rugby League (ERL) Annual Report. Last year the organisation celebrated its 20th birthday. It was pleasing to see that some of the key people involved the inception, such as Richard Lewis and Kevin Rudd, reminisce so positively about their involvement and the achievements over the last 2 decades.

Even though there only being two formal competitions, the annual Wheelchair Rugby League Celtic Cup and the first edition of The Americas (North) Women's Championship staged during the year, the year saw record numbers of international games played across our three



geographical areas of responsibilities: Europe, the Americas and the Middle East & Africa. Congratulations to all members for staging international fixtures at whatever level, contributing to this success.

The continued growth of the Sport saw our membership expand as we welcomed both North Macedonia and Slovakia as members of the ERL. Both have progressed quickly with activity starting in their respective countries almost immediately.

However, 2023 was not all good news. We were disappointed to learn in the middle of the year that the FFRXIII had surrendered the rights to stage the 2025 Rugby League World Cups amidst reduced government funding, integral to their ambitious plans. Losing RLWC25 has been the catalyst for a series of reviews which pointed to the need for financial prudence in the international game. As a result the planned Men's and Women's Rugby League World Cup Qualifiers which would have doubled as the European Championships for the Autumn of 2023 were cancelled.

Unfortunately, as part of these changes, Romeo Monteith (Americas Regional Director) and Nigel Hansford (Finance Manager) moved on from European Rugby League, although I am pleased to report that both continue to be involved in Rugby League in various ways and have not been lost to the sport.

We also said "farewell" to Paul Nicholson who left the Board after he reached his third and final term as a director. Having given over a decade of service to European Rugby League, including a period representing us on the International Rugby League Board. Paul's knowledge and experience always added value and he also continues to contribute to Rugby League elsewhere.

Our paid staff, David Butler, Jovan Vujosevic and Remond Safi and our lead volunteer network of Phil Caplan (Media Manager), George Stilianos (Social Media Manager), James Vukmirovic (Website Manager), Martin Crick (Coaching Manager), Tom Mather (Match Officials Manager), Phil Smith (Match

Officials Tutor) and Steve Hogan (Match Officials Tutor) continue to help us take positive strides forward and bring all their enthusiasm and expertise to their roles.

Our board continues to provide a good balance of scrutiny and challenge alongside providing support and encouragement to our staff to ensure that we meet our ambitions to be a well-governed organisation.

Finally, I would like to thank our members for their continued efforts in growing Rugby League. The content of the Annual Report is predominantly the collective efforts and successes of the hard work of your clubs, coaches, match officials and volunteers who continue to give their all to make Rugby League a success.

EUROPE

In total, 42 Senior International Matches were played involving European teams during 2023, continuing to demonstrate the appetite for the international game in the continent. In addition to the 27 men's, 9 women's and 5 wheelchair games played, there were 23 youth and student internationals and 2 PDRL international games played, making a record 67 international exchanges!

The vast majority of these games took place as bilateral exchanges, demonstrating the robustness of the national federations to bounce back from the disappointment of the cancellation of the RLWC25 qualification competitions, which included debuts for Netherlands women's and Albania and North Macedonia's men's teams.

2023 also made history as Tonga men became the first tier two nation to meet England in a three match series, France also broke new ground with a two match series away in Kenya. Elsewhere, Netherlands and Serbia showed their continued commitment to Rugby League playing 5 men's games each, with Serbia also playing 3 women's games to boot and Germany recorded a record attendance for the annual Griffin Cup match.

Wheelchair Rugby League continued its upward rise in popularity, with Wales being made to work hard for the 7th Celtic Cup, being held to a draw by Ireland for the first time, whilst England and France wowed the masses with 2,300 in attendance at the Leeds Arena in England, before a packed house at the Palais Des Sport in Marseilles watch the rematch on French soil. Wheelchair activity took place in its most northernly location, just 500km south of the Arctic Circle in the fjords town of Sogndal in Norway, delighting the locals who took part.

At junior level, England, Scotland, Wales and Ireland, in partnership with European Rugby League, added an U16s and U18s Men's "Four Nations" tournament to complement the Student version which has been in place for over 20 years. Wales lifted the U16s trophy after a clean sweep in all three games, whilst England were victorious in the U18s event despite a loss at home to Ireland. England lifted the Student trophy after three wins including inflicting a record defeat on Wales.

Domestic competitive activity put the global pandemic firmly behind it, with competitions men's competitions recommencing in Scotland and Poland whilst both Scotland and Wales launched their own domestic wheelchair competitions. Greece's men's and women's competitions notably went from strength to strength, supported by the delivery of a Match Officials course by European Rugby League Educator Andrew Pilkington and Rugby League in Italy also showed a new lease of life.

AMERICAS

In 2023, members continued a steady march towards full normality of operations post Covid. There were robust domestic championships and several representative and international games.

Canadian Provincial domestic championships were executed in both British Columbia and Ontario. The return of the Ontario Championship with three club teams marked a major milestone as the Championship had not been played for several years. Canada also executed a Women's Competition featuring Ontario, British Columbia and Alberta.

In the United States, club Championships were staged on the East and West Coasts. Four men's club took part in the USARL Championship whilst Under the Pacific Coast Rugby League banner there were 8 clubs in action between California and Utah. The winners from each conference clashed for the National Championship, with Dead Pelicans from California emerging winners over Jacksonville. There were several women 13s games played across the country as well.

In the Caribbean, Jamaica once again delivered a full calendar of competitions across U14, U16, U19, Intercollegiate and community club National Championships.

The women's domestic game continued to grow with playing of the nation's first domestic 13s Championship.

Several international matches took place in the region. Canada, USA, and Jamaica played for the Americas North Women's Championship in Kingston, with Canada emerging inaugural champions. In men's action, USA defeated Jamaica 30-26 in the only ranking men's game.

The USA governance reform is still ongoing with several clubs and League applying to join the reform process and elect a new governing body in early 2024.

MIDDLE EAST & AFRICA

The MEA Region has shown further growth in all categories with the increase in women's participation particularly encouraging. The first ever bilateral international fixtures were played (ones outside the MEA Championship) with South Africa playing Kenya in two men's senior internationals, and Nigeria playing Ghana and Kenya against Uganda in women's rugby league.

Local championships were completed by Lebanon (men), Ghana (women, men and youth), Nigeria (women, men, youth), Cameroon (women, men), Kenya (women, men, youth) and South Africa's seasons concluding in 2024.

MEA nations are expressing a growing desire for more input in the future of the game which demonstrates their growing capacity and confidence. The region welcomed its newest member, the Kenyan Rugby League Federation, as an affiliate member, showing further growth: within 12 months KRLF hosted Uganda women's national team and France men in late 2023, in what was a diplomatic success for the sport. Kenya's men also played two away games against South Africa.

The MEA Steering Committee appointed its new extended committee for the next 12 months with representatives from the two full members, Dr Frans Erasmus (South Africa) and Nayef Abi Said (Lebanon), plus elected affiliate member representative Andy Gilvary (Ghana) and observer member representative Fortnuate Irankunda (Uganda). Three independent members have also been added to the committee with Vuyolwethu Bokwe (Chair), Bolu Fagborun and Saad Boujmal. Remond Safi has been appointed as secretary of the steering committee. A subcommittee has been established to develop the region's first strategy.

Elsewhere, Ghana completed a technical L1 coaching and match official education, while English club York Knights visited Uganda with 13 tourists to deliver on ground support, helping to set up the local championship and academy.

Finally, the region continued to embrace the innovation initiated by Rugby League Federation Ghana's partnership with Salford, as London Broncos paired with South Africa, Hull KR with Nigeria, and Leeds with Kenya. The collective plan is to develop player pathways to the clubs and establishing academies to be led by local coaches. Amongst various knowledge transfer activities between the pro clubs and their African partners, the Red Devils produced a set of branded apparel that the club sold out of, with the funds raised invested in the Ghana rugby league academy project.

GOVERNANCE

Changes to the Board

Luc Lacoste (FFRXIII Nominated Director) resigned his position in July 2023 due to ill health and was replaced by Gilles Dumas as the FFRXIII's nomination to the Board. At the 2023 AGM Paul Nicholson (Independent Director) reached the conclusion of his third and final permitted term of office. It was decided not to replace the position as other organizational matters took priority.

SUB-COMMITTEES

The ERL administers three sub-committees, all of which operate independently of the plenary Board and reporting to it at the subsequent Board Meeting.

Dispute Resolution Committee

The DRC was created following a Board resolution taken at its 19 February 2016 Board Meeting. It is a standing committee of the ERL and is the first instance organ for Members to lodge formal grievance. The Committee is convened by order of the Board upon formal complaint being lodged in writing to the ERL General Manager or the Board and therefore there are no sitting members or fixed terms. The DRC was not required to be convened in 2023.

Financial, Audit and Risk Committee

The purpose of the FARC, constituted in February 2012, is to advise the Board on financial management, audit and risk management matters. In 2023 FARC was chaired by Brian Juliff, with Dean Andrew and Tatiana Doncaster as sitting members. Robert Graham (RFL Finance Director) is a coopted member with ERL General Manager David Butler in attendance.

Meetings are usually held approximately every six months, however in 2023 FARC only met in June 2023. In addition, FARC also monitored the risk register in close consultation with the executive team.

FINANCIAL REPORT

The following commentary is provided on the Annual Accounts for 2023:

- 1. This report covers the year to 31st December 2023:
- 2. A net loss of £24,287 for the year is reported as compared to a profit of £4,774 for 2022.
- 3. The Accounts have been reviewed by Howard Matthews Partnership and they have reported that nothing has come to their attention that causes them to believe that the financial statements have not been prepared so as to give a true and fair view of the state of the Company's affairs as at 31 December 2023.
- 4. Total revenues were £119k. Budgeted income was reduced drastically following postponement of the RLWC Qualifying competitions and the associated income.
- 5. Member fees realised approximately £6k of income and are being collected on time.
- 6. Expenditure at £141k was lower than planned given the postponement of the competitions and focussed on essential expenditure only.
- 7. Staffing costs were below budget following a restructure of consultancy services, with Americas Director Romeo Monteith and Finance Manager Nigel Hansford's consultancies being terminated during the year as cost saving measures.
- 8. Net assets decreased as a result of the loss in the year from £300k from £324k and are represented by £195k in bank balances; £112k EU Accrued income with debtors and creditors accounting for the difference.
- 9. The EU balance has been carried forward once again. It is hoped that the matter will be resolved within the 2024 financial year. If we receive more than £112k the extra amount will be taken to profit in the year but conversely if we receive less than this amount then the write down would be taken as a loss in the 2024 year income statement.
- 10. Cash flow was satisfactory with combined balances of £195k at the year end.
